The campaign moves on. In Notebook of this week's Tablet, there is an item about "Catholic Voices for Reform" which is a CWO initiative involving other groups working for a renewed Church. This is in direct response to the "Catholic Voices" group set up by a rather conservative sector of our church. The press release has now gone out and, hopefully, requests for interviews from the media will follow. The press release is shown in full later in this e-news.

The campaign will develop as follows:-

Until June: prayer and reflection – see below for reflections on John 21: 3 – 6, and new reflection for this month.

A letter has been sent to Archbishop Vincent Nichols (see below) and copies sent to all the bishops of England and Wales and the Papal Nuncio.

July to the actual visit: action including a presence at **Greenbelt festival 27 – 30 August. We need people to volunteer for our stall.** Please consider giving up a day for CWO to be on our Greenbelt stall. This year is really important because the Pope's visit has created interest in us. **I need to have numbers by end of June** so please let me know if you would like to come for a day. I can get you a ticket to the festival and CWO can help with travel costs if necessary.

There will be a weekend for prayer and reflection **Friday 6 to Sunday 8 August at Noddfa** <http://www.noddfa.org.uk/> . **This is open to all members.** The cost is £80. There is wheelchair accessibility.

Catholic Voices for Reform press release – May 2010

The word 'reform' is to differentiate ourselves from the recently formed official Catholic Voices group. From Catholic Voices For Reform you will hear a section of the ordinary members of the RC Church, not necessarily the well known theologians etc., but people deeply concerned at the present state of the Church, who are influential with others in daily life. These people, women and men, have formed the backbone for the call for change in the Church some for many years but others more recently. They are its loyal opposition who have remained within the Church calling for reform.

All the contacts named below know different people who can speak on a variety of topics – e.g. women in the Church and the ordination of women, sexual abuse within the Church, the lost principles of Vatican II, lesbian and gay issues and the need for Papal and Church Governmental reform. If you contact these people they will direct you to different speakers in various parts of the U.K. and contacts for newspaper interviews.

This is our first press release as Catholic Voices for Reform, to let you know we are here. We will try to fulfil any commitments you ask us. We are open to talk on issues and collaborate in discussions on national and local radio and TV. All our members are people with different experiences who have found a conflict between these life experiences and the official teachings of the Church. Reflections on John Chapter 21: 3-6

This text was considered by Oblates of Douai Abbey at their weekend retreat when this was Sunday's Gospel. It was agreed that Peter and his followers were unsuccessful until they did what the unrecognised Lord commanded them to do. Until Peter recognises Jesus in women's ministry, the nets will continue to come up empty - or at least full of jellyfish and other undesirable catches!

Simon Peter and the others are fishermen. They work together for their livelihood. They have an acknowledged leader who takes the initiative. They have skills, experience and previous success. They have resources in their boat and a lake to fish in. Before they were called to follow Jesus, presumably this way of life was enough, meeting their material and spiritual needs, and their need for belonging and community.

But being on the road with Jesus has been an unsettling experience. They do not know what to make of it, now that Jesus has been put to death. So they have left Jerusalem and gone back to Galilee to pick up their old life. Community is holding, as is the leadership and decision making structure. The need to eat, the fish in the sea, the boat and nets are to hand. Yet their work is in vain. Perhaps it is no longer satisfactory because their time spent following Jesus has opened up new possibilities, new visions of how to live. They are at a loss. "That night they caught nothing."

As day breaks, unrecognised by them, Jesus stands on the shore. He calls out to them in the familiar vernacular: Hi Guys! His name for them is equal, affectionate, colloquial, addressing them as colleagues, neighbours, friends. He redirects their efforts and leads them to such a plentiful catch they barely have the strength to haul it in.

And now they recognise the Risen Lord. All that they aspired to as they accompanied Jesus on the road to Jerusalem can be lived in full as was promised. Jesus, Lord and Teacher, is still with them, still shows them the way, still cares for them. They are still entrusted with Jesus's mission to be the "fishers of men."

How is the Risen Lord present?

Where do we, who would follow him today, go to meet him?

How do we recognise him?

And how do we deal with the patriarchal language as well as the social and economic structures which render women invisible if not excluded?

Letter sent to Archbishop Nichols 10 May 2010 copies sent to Papal Nuncio and the Bishops of England and Wales

Dear Archbishop Vincent,

We write this letter to you from a deep love of the Church and as a part of its loyal, but often uncomfortable opposition, to those who hold leadership roles in the Church. Catholic Women's Ordination has a membership made up of many ages and walks of life but many of us in Catholic Women's Ordination have served this Church faithfully, for many years, but have watched its gradual decline in morals and leadership with great concern.

It is widely held that much of the lasting success of the visit of Pope John Paul II to Britain in 1982 was due to the way the bishops of England and Wales and of Scotland briefed him. What he said to Ireland was rather different to what he said in Britain. It is to be hoped that the current briefing by the hierarchy will be equally fruitful. It is important that the Pope's talks to various elements of the community are positive and inspiring rather than negative and chiding. One aspect of the 1982 talks was that highly controversial issues like the means of responsible parenthood were not touched on (in all the talks there was only one reference to "a contraceptive mentality", which is not the same as discussing forbidden means).

One of the main aims of the British government's invitation to the Pope, with which all other parties agree, is to show the importance of faith based communities working together.

Letter to Archbishop Nichols 10 May 2010 (continued)

We would like to suggest that the following points need to be raised by the bishops to the Pope because they are at the heart of re-gaining the trust of the Catholic community at this time of deep crisis in the Church: -

The recent apology of the Catholic Bishops of England and Wales for the many cases of sexual abuse worldwide is the beginning of a move in the right direction. We hope this will be followed by practical help to all victims of abuse as appropriate. There are also many other areas of theological default that require open and free discussion. The days of muzzling different viewpoints by refusing discussion are over. No one of us and no one church has all the truth. This culture of covering up seems largely to be derived from a distorted understanding of "the perfect church" whose imperfections must be hidden at all costs!

The Beatification of Cardinal Newman gives the Church in Britain a great opportunity to discuss Newman's concept of the development of doctrine. In most parishes, there is a considerable lack of knowledge of the history of the Church. As a result, many still believe that the Church has never changed. 'Ecclesia semper reformanda' is a central concept in Church history. If we deny our people an education, which is theirs by right, we will not pass on to our young people a thinking mature church in which they will feel at home. We would like the Pope to put emphasis on this point in any of his sermons.

The 45th anniversary year of Vatican II gives the Pope a great opportunity to re-visit the values and spirit of Vatican II during his time here; a spirit that the bishops of England and Wales re-visited in their inspired documents "the Sign we Give", particularly for its endorsement for collaborative ministry, and the findings of the new update of The Common Good. It would be helpful if these could get papal commendation, coupled with further encouragement to all the parishes to continue supporting CAFOD's campaign to 'live simply'.

We urge a re-examination of the meaning of women being made in the image of God (Gen 1.27) and its implications for ministry so that women may fulfil their rightful vocation in the Church.

We look forward to your response; we see this Papal visit as opening the way for true and free discussion in our Church in Britain.

Pope Benedict's visit to England and Scotland from 16-19 September 2010

Thursday 16 September – Scotland

When Pope Benedict arrives, he will go firstly to Scotland where he will be received by Her Majesty The Queen, members of the Royal Family and people representing British society in the Palace of Holyrood House.

Having met the Queen, the Pope will travel to Glasgow where he will celebrate an open-air Mass in the evening and then he will fly from Glasgow to London. The Holy Father will then be based in London for the remainder of the visit.

Friday 17 September – London

On the second day of the visit, Pope Benedict is going to St Mary's University College, Twickenham, where there will be three aspects to his visit. The first is that he begins the day praying with representatives of religious congregations - particularly those who have a charism for education and a history of education. He will then go and meet about 3,000 young people - schoolchildren, students - to celebrate Catholic education. From there he will then meet with religious leaders and people of religious faith. He will discuss with them religion and belief in our society. Later in the day, the Pope is scheduled to meet with the Archbishop of Canterbury to speak with him in front of the Anglican diocesan bishops and the Catholic diocesan bishops of England and Wales.

He has then been invited, as part of the State visit, to address British society. Representatives of British society will be invited to Westminster Hall to hear the Pope's address.

He will finish off the day with the Archbishop of Canterbury and Christian leaders at Westminster Abbey to celebrate Evening Prayer.

Saturday 18 September – London

On the third day of the visit, Pope Benedict will celebrate Mass in Westminster Cathedral where he will also, from there, greet the people of Wales.

Later in the day he will visit a home for older people, giving the Pope an opportunity to go to those who cannot meet with him, and then be present at a Vigil of prayer which again will be in the open air in London.

Sunday 19 September - West Midlands

The final day of the visit is focused very much on the beatification of Cardinal John Henry Newman, and the Pope will celebrate that beatification in the West Midlands. He will conclude the day by meeting with the bishops of England, Scotland and Wales in Oscott College before returning to Rome from Birmingham Airport.
