In fact a quarter of CWO members attending the Conference were male, the highest percentage of any group.

Thank you, Mike, for being such a wonderful support and inspiration to so many. I weep for your family who have lost such a wonderful husband and father and for CWO who have lost such a special friend. May you rest in peace and pray for us in heaven.

SHOULD THE VATICAN GIVE MORE POWER TO WOMEN?

It's a joy to watch MIRIAM DUIGNAN, Communications Director for the Wijngaards Institute for Catholic Research, bringing her calm good sense and detailed historical and theological knowledge to the BBC's The Big Questions

Our thanks to SUE WILLIAMSON for sending us this account of the show:

Some thoughts about Miriam's contribution to 'The Big Question' on Vocations Sunday.

While some of us were on the Piazza of Westminster last Sunday pointing out women's vocations to all forms of ministry, Miriam Duignan was battling it out on 'The Big Question' dealing with a question as to whether the RC Church can change without women at every level of ministry (my interpretation of said question).



Miriam answered her neighbour (Caroline Farrow of Catholic Voices, married to a member of the Ordinariate) by pointing out that women had been in all forms of ministry until the Middle Ages. Miriam was also able to say that in recent years the Magisterium had gone into various contortions to defend the male priesthood by using the models of Christ the Bridegroom (which only men can be apparently) and the Church as the Bride. The

movement away from Christ's humanity being the most significant aspect of the affirmation of Christ in the Eucharist has been lost and it has done much damage to women.

Women's lack of voice in their control over their reproductive rights was also mentioned. One young woman in the audience, who said she was not a believer, nevertheless supported Miriam in

everything she said. The same could be said of Frank Callus, from ACTA in Cardiff, who rebuffed the all-too-vociferous leader of the Latin Mass Society. The latter claimed to have the Truth, the whole Truth and nothing but the Truth!! The audience and the chairman certainly supported Miriam and it was evident that Miriam did have truth on her side and not the loud gentleman from the Latin Mass Society.

WOW ACTION PLANNED FOR ROME

As doors around the world are opened to Roman Catholics during Pope Francis' Jubilee of Mercy, one door remains inexplicably closed. During the Vatican's "Jubilee for Priests," Women's Ordination Worldwide (WOW) will host their own "Jubilee for Women Priests," lifting up all women who are called to the priesthood and all who call for equality in Church structures.

5 - 6 pm **Reception** celebrating WOW's 20th anniversary

6 - 8 pm Women Priests Project - photo exhibition and gallery talk with artist Giulia Bianchi. This project explores the life and faith of Roman Catholic Women Priests, excommunicated for disobeying a canon law that reserves the priesthood to men. Since 2013, Bianchi has met and photographed more than 70 women priests. womenpriestsproject.org



3 June - An Open Door Witness

Piazza Pia for a prayerful witness, offering a visual guide to "opening the door" to women. WOW will then walk the pilgrim's path to St. Peter's as the Jubilee Mass for Priests gets underway.

... AND IT HAS BEEN BUSY IN ROME RECENTLY,

Olive, Kate McElwee and I met to pray in Rome on the feast of the Annunciation and to acknowledge the work being done for Catholic Women's Ordination. Olive and I started with prayers and reflection in St Peter's. It is a challenging place to pray, particularly as our metaphor of closed doors has never been so apt. We tried to get to the Mass that was happening in French, only to be turned away at every barrier. We had wished to enter the Basilica through the Holy Door of Mercy, only to find it firmly closed and locked. So we stayed in the Chapel, prayed, and left WOW prayer cards.



After a lovely lunch with Kate McElwee at the pub where much WOW work has been done, we hoisted the WOW banner on the bridge, which again was a metaphor for our dialogue, but also practical as the level of security was so tight that it would have been unwise to do this nearer the Vatican. Only WOW would manage such an adventure on a day when the temperature reached thirty!

I was asked to extend my trip to Rome to be part of a New Humanity congress hosted by the Focolare movement in Castelgandolfo. A lot of the themes were of interest to me and involved education, charity work and the environment. However I was firmly told not to mention women's ordination or to go up for a blessing at Mass. Although this saddened me, I agreed.

A few days before I left, the WOW Enews came out with a prayer I had written for the Feast of the Annunciation, a day when we particularly pray for women's ordination. Knowing I am part of this worldwide movement gave me encouragement and I prayed I would have the chance to mention CWO and WOW.

By the second day of having to sit in my place as everyone else in the eight-hundred strong conference went up for Communion, it was a struggle, and I asked the Holy Spirit to give me an opportunity. Over tea that evening, one of the Irish delegates asked me what I knew of Mary McAleese. I took my chance and spoke of how she welcomed us to Dublin at WOW 2001."But you can't mean Catholic women's ordination?" was the firm reply. "No discussion can happen".

I remembered Aquinas' words about Primacy of conscience and we continued the discussion. Gradually more people joined in and I suspected some agreed with me, though in that context no one would dare agree.

As I prayed that night, the image that came to mind was the following: a stream of living water was pushing against an old dam, and was starting to drip over the top, and push through holes in the creaky dam. Clerics in Roman garb rushed to plug the holes with their fingers, but it was too late, the living water was on the move!

I believe it is on the move in the Vatican: slowly, but those drips of living water will give life, and the Curia can't plug the dam for ever!



El Orden Sacerdotal

We continue our series of summarizing in English a little book in Spanish by German Benedictine monk Anselm Grün entitled 'The sacerdotal order' (*El Orden Sacerdotal*, 2002, Madrid, San Pablo, German original 'Die Weihe'). This month, Séverine Deneulin (Bath) summarizes pp. 25-29 on 'The ritual of ordination'.



In Acts, we read the story of the apostles laying their hands and praying over the seven chosen for the service of the table. In this we find the origin of ordination. The bishop and priests lay their hands on the ones chosen to serve the Church, and ask the help of the Holy Spirit in that task. These are the two pillars of the episcopal, sacerdotal and diaconal ordination. With time, other elements were introduced.

The ritual of ordination always takes place in the context of the Eucharist and starts with the presentation of the candidates to the bishop: a priest presents them and informs the bishop that the community has been consulted about the suitability of the candidates and that none of those in charge of their formation has any objection to them going forward. After the liturgy of the Word, the candidates solemnly promise, in the presence of the community and the bishop, that they will carry out their office to the best of their abilities, as a service to the Church and in obedience to the bishop. The candidates then put their hands in those of the bishop as a symbol of putting themselves in the hands of God.

Prostration: The bishop invites the community to pray, and the candidates to prostrate themselves, as a sign of their total dedication to God and an acknowledgment of their weaknesses and humanity. The candidates are not ordained because of their merit but because God has called them in their weakness. While they lay face on the ground, the community sings the litany of the saints.

Laying of hands in silence: The bishop lays his hands on the heads of each candidate and prays in silence that the Holy Spirit penetrates them, transforms them and enables them for their mission. All the priests, young and old, then do the same. Each will remember in this particular moment how they live their own consecration, the difficulties and the joys of the ministry. Each prays in silence over each candidate. No words are said. All priests present communicate in silence the strength of the Holy Spirit. Ordination is not a matter of human capacity but of the doing of the Holy Spirit.

Consecration prayer: The bishop then says the prayer in which the most important functions of the priests are highlighted: to collaborate with the bishop, to teach the faith and proclaim the Word of God. The prayer is inspired from the first letter to Timothy: that they maintain firm what they have received, that they transmit faithfully the treasure they have received in the good news of Jesus. The author of 1 Tim then exhorts ministers to live in coherence with their ministry.

Anointing of hands: After receiving their priestly albs, the bishop anoints their hands. Anointing is always a sign of the gift of the spirit. The prayer of the bishop is that the Holy Spirit strengthens the priests in their mission, as it is these hands that will bless, and through which the love of God will be manifested. All sacraments require bodily contact. The anointing is also a sign that is the Holy Spirit who pours out Her gifts in empty hands, so that through them, through the hands of the priests, Jesus can go towards people.

CONGRATULATIONS! to our own PIPPA BONNER, for her letter to the Tablet on Amoris Laetitia:

RESPONDING TO FRANCIS' EXHORTATION, 14 April 2016 |

In his apostolic exhortation on the family, Amoris Laetitia, Pope Francis refers to the "internal forum" for divorced and remarried Catholics as "a renewed encouragement to undertake a responsible personal and pastoral discernment" with an examination of conscience, accompanied by a priest.

As someone who has had experience of the internal forum – after my divorce my first marriage was annulled but my second marriage was to a man who was divorced, so I was stuck in an canonical cul-de-sac – I can say that for me it was a pastoral, graced experience which meant I could keep receiving Communion. My husband later became a Catholic, and had his first marriage annulled, so in the end we were able to have a Nuptial Mass.

Lay people were active before each of the two Synods of the Family, through participation in parish discussion groups, completing offical questionnaires and communicating directly with their bishops about family issues. Pope Francis is now asking for our continued participation. I hope that lay people, priests, Religious and bishops will take up his call, and respond to this pastoral document with discernment and collegial action, and work together to create a pastoral way forward in our local churches, in a collaboration that is sensitive to different cultures and needs, but will benefit families around the world.


It is a pity that Pope Francis could not go further and adjust the outdated rules and 'doctrines' on sexual morality.


