CATHY'S STORY

FINDING TRANQUILITY IN CHALLENGING THE STATUS QUO

When CWO received a call for help from this writer, we did what we could. This is her story.

'And what did you hope to achieve by that?'

Thus mused my sceptical work colleague as I described my silent witness in favour of the ordination of women at a recent ordination in my local Catholic parish.

I hadn't intended to go at all. We had an ordination in our parish a couple of years ago and I came away from it feeling cross and alienated. It was a former parishioner and I don't disrespect either his commitment or his journey. But the FUSS that was made over it....

The sanctuary had been freshly carpeted in deep red for the occasion (RIP the excellent acoustics the building possessed beforehand), flowers arranged, readers rehearsed, parishioners warned to arrive early and not to hog all the car parking spaces, etc. The choir was usurped by an imported all clerical seminary choir which only seemed to know how to sing in Latin. Rows and rows of diocesan clergy took up the front pews at

the service. It was all *so male* somehow and as an involved female member of the laity I think we felt irrelevant - as if it was all happening over our heads. I vowed at that point NEVER to go to another ordination in the RC church until women priests were finally allowed.

I have long believed that the Holy Spirit has been prompting the ordination of women in the Catholic Church, albeit to a reformed and reordered concept of service.

So the desperate language of the diocesan prayer for (male) vocations to the priesthood annoys me. We have vocations, but the institutional church is so terrified of conceding women's equality with men that it refuses to hear Her clear message.

Instead, in European countries, and in England and Wales in particular, we have stop-gapped the problem by importing former Anglicans (many against the ordination of women in the Anglican church) and by depriving developing countries of their own clergy, which are sorely needed at home.

So, when our church choir was recently invited to sing at another ordination in our parish - this time of a local former (unmarried) Anglican vicar who had already reached the usual Catholic retirement age, I baulked at the idea and said a firm 'No, I'm not coming' to our organist.

That's when the pressure started. And to be honest, I am usually a very committed chorister and become irritated when colleagues take the 'I'll come if I've got nothing better to do' approach to our church choir. 'We need you' I was told in no uncertain terms. And I did feel a bit bad leaving the only other alto on her own. To make matters more challenging, the choir had been given some rather difficult music to sing too.

So, despite my deep-seated misgivings, I relented and turned up to the rehearsals against my better judgement and set about getting the choir the support it needed in order to deliver a good sound on the day. But I knew that I'd only be able to turn up at the event if I somehow made my position clear.

That is when I contacted CWO.



As with quite a few organisations on the radical end of the church spectrum, I had been supportive of CWO for years but never got around to being a paid-up member. I was delighted to receive rapid and supportive communications from people I hadn't met. Browsing the website, I noted that CWO member demonstrate outside Cathedrals wearing purple.

So, I trawled the internet and ordered a simple purple dress. From CWO I received the loan of a stole which stated 'Ordain Women' in bold white letters, and someone else sent me a CWO badge. My attire was ready.

The event came along and proceeded as expected. In the end we mastered the music and it all went swimmingly. It was still important to honour the journey of the ordinand, whatever his provenance.

Disappointingly few of my friends were prepared to join me by donning a purple scarf in solidarity with me but I didn't care. Even if I'd been the only voice in the wilderness, I would have persevered. And no one said a word.

Not a **WORD!** Make no mistake, they noticed all right. I was standing at the front in the choir ranks and even sat and chatted to the Bishop at the reception after the Mass.

I concluded that the serried ranks of clergy just didn't want to lose an argument - so they said nothing. Maybe some of them were ashamed. And if they weren't, they should have been.

I felt not a single trace of embarrassment. I knew I was bearing witness to something fundamental and something that is going to come to pass. It was the ONLY way I could've been present.

So, to answer my colleague's question 'What did I achieve'? Well no revolution obviously, and no debate, at least there. But I had the courage of my convictions. I participated in they only way I could.

The question of the ordination of women in the Catholic church will not go away, in fact there has been a vibrant public debate about it recently in the letter pages of the Tablet and many members of the existing clergy have no problem with it. I believe it will happen. I just pray that I will live to see it.

For having had the courage and the conviction to have carried out such a brave act of witness - too many of our parishes remain terrifying places when it comes to questioning the status quo. And for having had the courage to share it with our readers.

Isn't it **shameful**, that within our Christian creed that preaches love and acceptance, we Catholics only too often can't say what we really think?

Enough! Time to call it out.

When Dr Mary McAleese, former president of Ireland, was awarded the Alfons Auer Award for Ethics for her work in canon law and children's rights by the University of Tubingen on 30th November this year, We Are Church Ireland and the School of Religion at Trinity College Dublin determined to mark the occasion.

Together with Voices of Faith, the campaign for women's leadership in the Catholic Church, they invited **Sr Joan Chittister, OSB**, the international spiritual writer, speaker and theologian to share a platform with Mary. Then they livestreamed their conversation with Ursula Halligan, political editor of Ireland's TV3.

And ask yourself: Why isn't the Vatican beating a path to their door?

ON THEIR WORDS

"(Sister Joan's) point that resonated strongly with me was about language, how the language of all our prayers and liturgical events is male. She considers this to be a major problem, and that the misogynistic attitudes prevalent in the Church will not be changed until the language is changed. So she urged all of us to do everything we can in any type of religious event in which we participate, to get rid of all traces of sexist language...

As regards the defective nature of Catholic sexual teaching, she (Sr. Joan) said that it dated from long before Christ, back to the ancient rural communities, tilling the earth and growing their food. They sowed the seed in the earth, and it grew. So they presumed that human fertilization was similar, in that the woman's body received the life-giving semen from the man, and it grew... That was the biology on which



Thomas Aquinas worked to produce his teaching that women are secondary and of lesser importance. It is only in the last two hundred years that the ovum was discovered, and revealed the fact that the woman contributed equally to the life-giving process. So she concluded that the Church's sexual teaching was not so much bad theology, but, first and foremost, bad biology."...

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"Recalling the six years she spent studying for a doctorate in canon law in Rome, living in the environs of a seminary and monastery, she (Mary McAleese) said she had encountered many young seminarians and priests.





'I became very much aware of the dysfunction at the heart of seminary life and the dysfunction at the heart of much of the priesthood... The number of fakehetero misogynistic homophobic gays I met frightened me. The homophobia of people who are gay is a lie - it is a vicious lie. But they live it and in living it, apart from making themselves miserable, they also make a lot of other people miserable.' She said that as pastors, 'their capacity for dispersing misery is really immense. That worries me greatly."


Parishioners listened with interest, above and left.

As the Catholic Church struggles under the weight of centuries-old misogyny, it is surprising to see how, in the early medieval period, abbesses had shared governance with bishops. As that church struggles with a shortage of male priests to celebrate the sacraments, it is instructive to see how many sacramental ministries were once exercised by female monastics.


