



LETTER FROM JOHN J SHEA, OSA, TO POPE FRANCIS

eNews had no space to print this in Lent, and is glad to do so now. Augustinian priest John J Shea stepped aside from active ministry until women are ordained. He has received 'canonical warnings' and 'punishment' threats for his stance.

Dear Pope Francis,

February, 2017



I hope you are well and that you are allowed to receive this letter. I pray for you and I am inspired by your obvious concern for the poor and the environment.

Enclosed again are two letters about the ordination of women: the first is sent to each member of the Council of Cardinals with whom you are meeting; the second is a letter for background that I mailed to all the ordinaries of the United States at the beginning of Lent in 2014.

When you talk about the need for honest dialogue on the issues that we face as a church, I am somewhat heartened. You keep insisting: "dialogue, dialogue, dialogue." In fact, you say: "dialogue fearlessly."

Unfortunately, however, there is not now, nor has there ever been, any fearless—let alone gender inclusive—dialogue on the ordination of women, although this is arguably the most crucial issue in the church.

Can the sea-changing collaboration of bishops and theologians at the time of Vatican II serve as a model for what needs to happen today? Can you empower that kind of thoroughgoing synod-like collaboration as part of your concern for honest dialogue in the church?

How can our church become whole if women are "not fully in the likeness of Jesus"? Not to address the body-and-soul wholeness of women—to leave this wholeness ignored, denigrated, and denied—is a missing-the-mark scandal that continues to disgrace our church.

Is it wrong to hope in anticipation of Lent that the archaic structures of the church—clung to so fiercely as unchangeable yet skewed so inordinately in patriarchal privilege—can be seriously addressed?

Pope Francis, will the day come when the church's recognition of women rivals the mercy that is the cornerstone of your papacy?

Dear Mary,

Thank you for your letter of 25th March headed Vocations Sunday. Your letter outlines the views of 'Catholic Women's Ordination' on the Church's criteria for selecting candidates for ordination. You offer a number of observations that you believe should cause a change to the criterion of gender: the number of candidates who fit the current criteria; the competence of women in running church organisations; the perception of society that the current criteria are weird. These observations, however, do not lead inevitably to the necessity to remove the criterion of gender.

Pope Francis wishes women to take more senior roles in the leadership of the Church and he has appointed a commission to study the possibility of women deacons. In addition, he has also indicated that he is open to the ordination of more married men. So there is movement in the Church around the criteria for ordination and about the role of women. Let's all pray that the Holy Spirit will guide the Church into making wise choices on these matters.

May this Easter season bring many blessings to you and your family.


"Women are fully entitled to actively take part in all settings, and their rights must be affirmed and protected, including through legal instruments wherever it may prove necessary," he said.

Some sources of hope

During the Sunday morning service nearly two weeks ago now, Elaine Storkey, formerly of Tearfund speaking at Emmanuel church, Didsbury, gave an outstanding sermon on the transformation of suffering in very scriptural terms. What emerged from it is what we can hope for. This was especially relevant in the week that followed with the terrible human tragedy in Grenfell Tower. Given the events of that week, I found it particularly sad that the service from the RC Cathedral in Cardiff this last Sunday was so uninspiring, with no women's voices to be heard.



It was then with great relief that I took someone to a local church where I have been attending a very interesting scripture course. As it was the feast of Corpus Christi, the parish priest, who always leads Mass with all the children sitting around a simple table, pulled out of a large basket a pink flamingo puppet which squawked hilariously. We learnt that flamingos are green when born, but turn pink because of eating prawns. The main point of this was that 'You are what you eat' which was totally relevant with the regard to the Eucharist. The children got it, as did the adults. This priest is also very supportive of women's ordination. Long may he speak out.

Also, the third episode of 'Broken' last week contained a very strong call for women's ministry from the mouth of the anguished priest, played by Sean Bean. Thank you, Jimmy McGovern, for such inspiring writing.

Let us find some more sources of hope for what women can bring to ministry.

BISHOP-ELECT JUNE OSBORNE

The Dean of Salisbury will be consecrated as the new Bishop of Llandaff, the leader of the Church in Wales, on 15th July, and installed on 22nd July at Llandaff Cathedral. She has a track record of ecumenism, as our member Pamela Perry wrote in 2015 of their Corpus Christi celebration:

Not only was it the first time that Catholics had processed in Salisbury since the 16th century, but
