



At the Piazza of Westminster on Vocations Sunday in 1994, a group representing the CWO (Catholic Womens Ordination) gathered in quiet protest. Purple is the chosen colour of the organisation to denote mourning for the lost gifts of women in the Roman Catholic Church and as a sign of the dignity of the royal priesthood of women. This liturgy of covering the front of Westminster Cathedral with a purple cloth and a purple Iris was to cleanse the RC Church from its all-male control. This was further emphasised during this liturgy by seven minutes of silence to signify the exclusion of women from administering publically all seven sacraments.

Our protest continues.

This book is not like other books that have been written on this topic. We're hoping it will stimulate fresh interest. We also hope to arrange book launches and discussions in other parts of the country – e.g. Leeds, Birmingham, South West and Wales, and any other part of the country that asks us. An electronic flier is attached to your CWO link email for distribution.

The book is based on over 20 years' experience of bringing this topic to public notice and the hazards this entails. It is written in six chapters (152 pages) and does not need to be read chronologically. The Chapter headings speak for themselves as they open up different vistas on the root of the problem. The authors are committed to remaining within the Catholic Church, but recognise that women's ministry, in its fullest inclusive sense, will only happen in a renewed Church. The book includes contributions from CWO members. It is written primarily for the general educated reader who is interested in a deeper understanding of this struggle and the important part it plays in highlighting the present theology on women, in the Catholic Church.

WOW Press Statement 25th Jan 2016

WOW welcomes Pope Francis' call to include women in foot washing ceremonies and hopes it signifies a bolder approach to ending sexist exclusion

Women's Ordination Worldwide (WOW) welcomes Pope Francis' formal decree confirming that women can and should be part of Holy Thursday foot washing ceremonies. We commend Pope Francis for moving our Church one step closer to the inclusiveness modelled by Jesus.

This may seem like a small move forward because women have already been included in this rite for many years in some churches. The fact that it is still prohibited by some parish priests around the world betrays the reality of the challenge women face at a local level, with many Church officials refusing to include women in the Last Supper commemoration.

Decrees such as this one from Pope Francis are important, because they send an official signal to the entire Catholic world that change, even when it is incremental, is happening. Jesus was taught the symbolic ritual of feet washing by a woman and we know that there were women present at his last Passover meal on Holy Thursday. If we are to be truly faithful to our tradition, women must be included in all our rituals and sacraments and we must continue to challenge those clerics who cling to their own interpretation of tradition, based on sexism alone. As Pope Francis warned earlier this week, those 'who say "it's always been done that way," and stop there have hearts closed to the surprises of the Holy Spirit. They are idolaters and rebels will never arrive at the fullness of the truth'.

We eagerly anticipate the day when women, head, heart, hands and feet will be fully welcome in the sacramental and governing leadership of our Church.'

And to friends, local and distant, for visits, messages, cards and practical support. A particular mention perhaps to my FB friends: my presence on Facebook raises the occasional eyebrow of those who imagine religious hermits to be bearded cave-dwellers, avid eschewers of all things technological. Without the day-to-day encouragement and emotional support abundantly offered by friends on social media, this journey would have been very much more difficult. Thank you everyone!

In other news: It wouldn't be an odd-numbered year without a visit from some sort of press representative. 2015 was the year of Reuters, in the person of a young independent photo journalist (Neil Hall) who hoped to be able to offer the story to Head Office in Singapore. He was prepared to duck & dive around my most debilitating treatments and eventually produced a mash-up of hermitage highlights in which Mrs Hennypenny is pleased to be playing a starring role. 

A recommendation to read Diarmuid O 'Murchu's 'Inclusivity: a Gospel Mandate'

During an advent retreat at Noddfa, the participants were introduced to some of the ideas in one of Diarmuid's recent books. As well as critiquing what happened after the Resurrection and basically showing that Luke's account could well be a patriarchal fantasma of Pentecost, Diarmuid shows that the role of women was crucial in maintaining the message of Jesus and reaffirming the Resurrection.

Diarmuid has many interesting chapters in his book, but the chapter heading that was particularly arresting was 'The Women who threaten Patriarchy'. Diarmuid often becomes very poetic in trying to express his main ideas. One of the verses found towards the end of the aforementioned chapter contains the following lines:....

'Beyond all the theories that time has construed,

Beyond the oppression we have too long endured.

The first ones commissioned for Easter proclaim

A woman-led mission we've brutally maimed.

But we can't keep subverting empowerment.


....What women empowered at the dawning breakthrough

Will bear fruit in season

Despite all the treason.

'Cos justice will render what deserves to endure.

Diarmuid goes on to say that 'Not until the women are themselves included will the Christian conscience be at peace'. Diarmuid points out that we all have to be aware of not colluding with



patriarchal values, especially those women who succeed in what once were male spheres. What Diarmuid calls for is 'The Companionship of Empowerment where 'the perennial examples of Gospel female initiative are paradigmatic ... for the transformation of all humans, male and female alike'.

Some other interesting chapters include 'Subversive Companionship' and 'The Inclusive Table'. This book merits some in-depth study which the staff at Noddfa are already participating in. It would be most worthwhile if some of us could find the time to get together to discuss this book. I am also aware that Myra's and Pippa's book merits plenty of discussion, but Diarmuid does offer a very in-depth take of some of the historical narratives.



It may be useful to compare and contrast the insights of both Diarmuid's book 'Inclusivity' and the 'Awakening' book by Myra and Pippa. Happy reading.

2015: A good year for reform

My three best memories for 2015 are:

1. The 62% YES vote in the Marriage Equality Referendum in May! What a joyous and truly Christian result that was! Some of our church leaders wanted a NO vote to reserve marriage exclusively for heterosexual couples and procreation. But a large majority, led by the young people of Ireland, showed true Christian values are alive and well in Ireland!

2. Pope Francis called off the CDF inquisition into the women



religious (LCWR) in the USA. And Pope Francis met the LCWR leaders in person to thank them for the good work they are doing working with the poor and marginalised. It is shocking that this inquisition was ever launched. But it came from the same Vatican that welcomed Cardinal Bernard Law and promoted him to high and luxurious offices after he fled justice in the USA where he led the cover up of sexual abuse by priests in his Boston diocese.

3. Twelve Irish priests called for an open discussion on the role of women in the RC Church, including ordained ministry. Popes John Paul II and Benedict XVI have tried to declare this topic closed. And Pope Francis is so far not prepared to open the door which his two predecessors closed without any proper discussion on this very important issue. In April 1976 the Pontifical Biblical Commission declared that there was nothing in the gospels to justify the exclusion of women from priestly ordination. As Pope Francis has said many times: what we need is dialogue, dialogue, dialogue! Especially on this important issue.

My three most disappointing memories from 2015 are:

1. Fr Tony Flannery is still out of ministry and officially "silenced", as are 5 other Irish priests. Despite Pope Francis pointing in the right direction for reform, the CDF still wields its power and enforces all aspects of Canon Law.

2. Not one woman was allowed to vote at the Synod on the Family. Only celibate males were allowed to vote. A Brother who was not a priest but was head of an order was allowed to vote. But none of the Sisters who were heads of orders and attended the Synod were allowed to vote!

3. Pope Francis again and again calls for discussion, discussion, discussion - but he refuses to allow any discussion on women priests! He appears to consider opinions of his two predecessors to be binding on him when they certainly are not.

Over a period of many years, when I lived in London, I used to take the Eucharist to people who were unable, for reasons of age or ill-health, to attend Sunday Mass. I saw this as a very important part of my own spiritual life, as well as being of benefit to the people I visited, and when I moved to Wales five years ago I missed it greatly. But I have



found a new and much less obvious apostolate.

Three years ago I joined the Cinnamon Trust, a charity based in Cornwall but active throughout the UK. It provides volunteers to look after animals - usually but not invariably dogs or cats - for elderly or disabled people. This means that, whatever their state of health or mobility, they are able to keep their beloved pets.

When we join, we say how much time we are able to give, and what we are willing to do, whether it be walking dogs, taking pets to the vet, short or even long-term fostering, or, if it proves necessary, transporting animals to a new home. My own involvement is simply to walk dogs two or three times a week.

Because without us these people would have to give up much-loved pets, which often stand between them and a very lonely life, a great

bond grows between the Cinnamon visitor and the pet owner, and the benefits are by no means one-sided. One of my dog owners has a very deep spiritual life, and her total confidence in God's answer to prayer has been a humbling experience for me.

Unexpected contacts can be made, as when I met a local Baptist minister, who had come to give Communion to my new friend, and who was very interested to hear about CWO, since she said that in her work she had had a great deal of support from Catholic women.

I doubt that I shall ever again be given the opportunity to take Communion to housebound people, but perhaps I am doing just as much good in a very different way.

Fr. Peter Daly went to watch *Spotlight* for himself. He went alone, knowing that it would be painful, he writes in the NCR his *Parish Diary* on Dec. 23rd, 2015.

When the movie was over I sat in stunned silence in the theater and waited for everyone else to leave. I did not want to have to talk. Above all I did not want to run into any parishioners. Worse, however, is this:

Thirteen years after the scandal broke many people have still not gotten the message. There is a new clericalism and arrogance among many of the younger clergy today.

Bishop Emeritus Crispian Hollis says that "between 10 and half a dozen bishops" would be prepared to explore the issue of married priests, *says the Tablet, 2nd January*. He saw a defeated proposal to support the issue put forward by Seamus Cunningham, Bishop of Hexham and Newcastle during a private session of the Bishops' Conference Plenary session last November, as a "testing of the waters", and not as a shutting-down of discussion.

"Canute and the tide come to mind," said Eileen Fitzpatrick, former chair of ACTA, "We do have a married priesthood in every diocese, in the form of former Anglicans." Bishop Crispian did not attend the plenary, but has spoken in favour of the ordination of married men.

Catholic Women Speak Book launch and overview

'Catholic Women Speak' is also a Network which named itself as the editor of this collection of writings of Catholic women, writing from very diverse perspectives. It is, however, the brainchild of Professor Tina Beattie and her department at Digby Stuart Research Centre for Religion, Society and

H u m a n Flourishing at Roehampton University, London.

At the book

launch, Tina gave an explanation of how the book came to be written. It was an attempt to get Catholic women's voices heard at the time of the Synod in Rome where it was clear that no women's voices were going to be heard, or if they were, they were not allowed to vote on the decisions taken. Not only is this an absurdity in this third millennium, but it is also an absurdity which needs to be redressed very quickly. Consequently, this book was published just prior to the Synod on the Family and a copy given to all the Cardinals and Bishops present at the Synod. Even though Cardinal Vincent Nicholls complained that he had three copies, it is a forlorn hope that he may have read any of it. We live in hope.

At the London book launch, it was stated that the profits from the


book would go to the St. Catherine of Siena College which is a virtual learning resource for theological education, particularly for women in the global south whose access to such resources is normally very limited. The title itself implies that there will be many voices present in this book. This is something that the former President of Ireland, Dr. Mary McAleese, the book launch chair, was quick to point out, especially when Pope Francis had called for the voice of women to be heard. There are many voices. Even though women are still seen to be on the periphery of the decision-making processes of the church, there are 600 million RC women in the Church. It is a very well populated periphery.

There were six women on the book launch panel representing the wide range of positions of the contributors to the book. The first contributor to speak was Rhonda Miska, who spoke for young Catholic women in ecclesial ministry. She described some of the very rewarding ministries in which she was engaged, but she also described some of the frustrations of being a young Catholic woman whose authority was not much respected. This contrasted strongly with other young women's experience in various professions where their education and expertise were properly recognised. She stated that she had no call to ordination, but she had a strong call to lay ministry.



Other speakers at the book launch included an African nun, a Philippina Australian theologian, a Dominican sister, a mother of Italian descent and Dr. Clare Watkins who lectures at Roehampton University. The speakers from the global south described the tremendously problematic cultural difficulties that women and men also experience in these societies. That should still be no bar to priesthood as Anne Arabome of the Sisters of Social Service in Los Angeles, maintained. Anne is actually now studying for a doctorate in systematic theology in Roehampton. What a great service to her people it would be if her gifts were properly recognised, even as far as ordination. Anne did point out that in many African countries still, a woman is not seen as a complete person in her own right. She only becomes viable when attached to a man. This is clearly a major stumbling block for women's progress in Africa. Anne quoted the Nigerian theologian, Teresa Okure , who stated that the marginalisation of women 'distorts the image of god in woman, denies her baptismal right and status in Christ, and greatly impoverishes not only the woman but the entire human community by belittling, killing and suppressing the god given talents of women'.

Other contributions from the panel were significant and varied, including the half-Italian mother who described the situation for her Italian grandmother where she had to wait until she was thirty before she decided to marry her very patient fiance, because she did not want endless children. The lack of contraception made life very difficult for our foremothers. Mary McAleese pointed out that her grandmother had produced 60 grandchildren, which is fortunately not happening now. The subsequent generations are having four children at most, which is an indication that adult Catholics have now taken responsibility for their own reproduction.



Mary McAleese's only other intervention was when one of the panel was somewhat lacklustre about the need for women's ordination. This person sees the Church as a male institution so why be part of it. Mary pointed out that this had been said about why women would want to enter politics, but fortunately they are now fully participating in the democratic process which is what we would like to see happen in the church.

This book launch was a very good taster of what is contained in the book itself. The book offers good descriptions of the list of contributors. It is divided into four sections, not necessarily of equal length. Each section is very well introduced. These sections consist of:

- 1. Traditions and Transformations,
- 2. Marriage, Families and Relationships (where Pippa Bonner has a contribution),
- 3. Poverty, Exclusion and Marginalisation and
- 4. Institutions and Structures.

The range of contributors is considerable, from Elizabeth Johnson, Janet Martin Soskice and Ursula King to women whose voices are only now being heard.

All the contributions are interesting and important to digest as representing the wide range of Catholic Women's experiences. I hope many readers of this Enews will feel the book is worth buying or at least sharing with others. The book is published by Paulist Press and retails, I believe for £11.99. (We had book launch reductions for £10).
