CWO Annual Gathering in York

Gathered to hear **Eve Rose-Keenan** at the **Bar Convent in York** on 29th Sept, CWO members were deeply impressed by her courage, her warmth and her transformative kindness. A survivor from abuse at the age of 10, Rose reclaimed her life with this central message: "Don't let the abuse define you. Reclaim your power!"



After many personal struggles, Eve was amongst the second wave of women priests in the Church of England, having carried out much of her training alongside the then-seminarians of Oscott, who were overwhelmingly supportive of her and of the idea of women in ministry.

Always drawn to chaplaincy work, the breaking news that 1,500 young girls in

Rotherham had been abused for decades drove her to expand her vision into politics, and she was a elected a Councillor in Rotherham, becoming the first ordained woman Mayor in Britain a year later.

In politics as Mayor (unlike her priesthood) as a priest and a survivor of abuse, she said that she never received hate mail, and nothing but 100% support in her work with young survivors. It has given her a feel for politics. She'd like to stand for Parliament. Asked whether she would be a Catholic if she could, she replied: "In a heartbeat!"





"Catholicism speaks to the poor, it speaks to the oppressed, it fights for justice"

"Let that justice apply to its women!" we said. "Reclaim it!" she said.



"I was part of the second wave of women priests. They all assumed I was there because it was my husband - but it wasn't, it were me!"

"I loved Cardinal Hume. He put his arm around me: "This woman is my sister," he said"

"The young girl burst into tears. "What Church would want me?" she said." "I got quite a lot of hatred at first (as a woman priest), hate emails, and hate mail. The worst thing was when my daughter was at the altar rail with her little hands out... when this priest .. refused her Communion... That was the worst."



"How has your home life with children nourished your ministry?"

"When I was a curate, and homeless people used to come to the door, they used to see them coming down the street. One would put the kettle on, one would start making the food for the homeless person, while I attended to his physical, otherwise spiritual needs... They are 100% behind it."

"I think, the most important thing, (for you, CWO) now, is not to give up...

Because, look, it has happened. .. and it's so normal, now, in Anglicanism."

PARISHIONERS' CALL SALISBURY, 6TH OCT

Parishioners from across the South and West gathered to listen to Bishop Emeritus Crispian Hollis and Canon Julie Bradley outline their call to ministry and to discuss shared ministry, married or celibate, with them. We were sorry that Amanda Mukwashi, CEO of Christian Aid, had had to withdraw.



Bishop Crispian spoke of MMaC, the Movement for

Married Clergy, and of his understanding that celibacy is a gift, which can only be freely given, not mandated as a requirement for ordination. He fully endorsed Bishop John Crowley's recent call in the Tablet for women's ordination to be discussed.



Canon Julie spoke of her surprise at realising that her call to ministry was hers, and not her husband's, and the complementary nature of their work. Discussion in the hall was

altogether respectful and positive, although many present expressed surprise when CWO was outlined. "Why have we never heard about Catholic women's ordination?" people asked, unaware that normal debate has been suppressed since Ordinatio Sacerdotalis in 1994.

Teresa Baron outlined the story of Ludmila Javarová, the Czech underground priest ordained in the Cold War, who was then scandalously ordered back to laity and silence by the Vatican. This witness was news to many present.

'ORDINATION OF WOMEN: PROS AND CONS'

A Study Day at Pusey House, Oxford, arranged by the Women's Ministries Initiative in the Orthodox Church -29th September



For those who argue that women cannot be priests because of 'tradition', I recommend paying close attention to the work of Dr. Ally Kateusz on the texts and iconography of Mary as Priest, which exposes the hidden history of women's early leadership in the Christian tradition, writes CWO member Miriam Duignan.

The study day in Oxford was a fascinating gathering of Anglican and Orthodox theologians and

minsters including Revd. Prof Andrew Louth who concluded that, as priests in the Orthodox tradition are tasked with calling down the Holy Spirit and not to be the physical likeness of Christ, it is hard to justify upholding the Orthodox ban on women priests.

Dr. Ally Kateusz spoke on behalf of the Wijngaards Institute on the topic 'Mary as a Temple High Priest'. Using material from her upcoming book, she condensed fifteen years of research into an hour in which she convincingly demonstrated that Mary was depicted as a priest and in a leadership position in countless images throughout the Christian world for many centuries.

Ally's research also points to the many ways the Vatican continues to hide evidence of women in leadership positions including fascinating images of an altar above St Peter's tomb in Rome which included a carved image of a woman presiding at the altar together with a man. Despite overwhelming evidence and eye witness testimony, the Vatican claims this was a portable altar and never held a fixed position over Peter – heaven forbid his tomb should have been sullied by such an image!
